

Committee Structure

This committee structure ensures that the Commission works to fulfill its mandate to serve all of the LGBTQ community in Washington State.

1. Communications and Outreach:

- a. Responsible for working with Commission staff on how to best communicate with stakeholders regarding the Commission's work
- b. Outreach to the community throughout Washington to gather information on issues and concerns
- c. Keep records of the work of the Commission for future reference and to preserve the history of the work of the Commission

2. Children, Youth, and Families:

- a. Gather information regarding LGBTQ children, youth, and their families
- b. Offer feedback on issues that directly relate to children, youth, and families of LGBTQ people including:
 - i. Access to foster care systems, adoption, and surrogacy
 - ii. Schools and school districts responses to LGBTQ students
 - iii. GSAs and related work
 - iv. Support services for LGBTQ youth including access to HRT and competent mental health services

3. Health and Wellness:

- a. Work on health and wellness issues that affect the LGBTQ community
- b. Monitor work on secession programs for LGBTQ community (smoking, alcohol, opioids, marijuana, etc.)
- c. Offer feedback on health and wellness-related programs and administration, including:
 - i. Access to competent services (health care and mental health)
 - ii. Appropriate forms and procedures that reflect LGBTQ competency

4. Economic and Business Development:

- a. Consider LGBTQ access to business and entrepreneurial opportunities
- b. Monitor the development of economic opportunities for LGBTQ people
- c. Identify opportunities for partnerships with Washington based businesses and LGBTQ business resource groups

5. Vulnerable Communities:

- a. Work on issues related to vulnerable groups within the LGBTQ community such as:
 - i. Seniors
 - ii. Immigrants
 - iii. Disable
 - iv. Veterans and spouses

- 6. Transgender, GNC, Gender Non-binary, and Intersex Communities:
 - a. Offer feedback from and outreach to people who identify as trans, gender nonconforming, and gender non-binary communities
 - b. Identify needs for the Intersex community and work on plans to support laws to protect intersex individuals in Washington
- 7. Communities of Color and Tribal Communities:
 - a. Identify the specific needs of LGBTQ people of diverse ethnic and racial backgrounds:
 - i. African American and Black communities
 - ii. Latina, Latino, Latinx communities
 - iii. Asian and Asian-American communities
 - iv. Pacific Islander communities
 - v. Desi and South Asian communities
 - vi. Indigenous, Native American and American Indian communities
